FOOD FOR THOUGHT



One of the most common non-compliances observed at handwashing food businesses relates to and facilities. handwashing Regular and thorough handwashing is critical in minimising the risk of crosscontamination. Bacteria and viruses that are present on our hands can be removed through correct handwashing. Each handwashing facility should be connected to a supply of warm running water from a single spout and be stocked with single use paper towel and soap (liquid soap in a dispenser is recommended). Hand wash basins must also remain unobstructed at all times. Hand sanitisers and antibacterial gels can be used in addition to proper handwashing, however they are not a substitute for handwashing.

It is estimated that 4.1 million Australians are affected by foodborne illnesses each year. The most common types of foodborne illnesses are:

Bacterial e.g. Salmonella, Campylobacter, E.coli and

Viral e.g. Norovirus, Rotavirus and Hepatitis A; Toxins produced by some bacteria such as Staphylococcus aureus, Bacillus cereus and Clostridium

FOOD SAFETY RATING SCHEME (FSRS

As of 1 July 2021, EHA has been part of the FSRS. In line and supported by the South Australian Food Business Risk Classification, the scheme targets high and medium (P1 and P2) food service businesses and bakeries who sell food to consumers direct from the site of inspection for 'immediate' consumption.
